Ynni'r Fro

- Welsh Government programme using European Structural Funds ran from January 2010 to December 2015
- Aimed to help social enterprises across Wales to develop their own community-scale renewable energy schemes.
- Engaged with over 200 social enterprises and funded more than 50
- Pipeline of more than 40 projects being actively supported by December 2015
- 8 schemes with 1.2MW capacity generating or in construction



Ownership models

- Owner operator project development and construction is led by the community and funded by the community, with the community operating the project;
- Commercial developer led project development and construction is led by a commercial developer, with the community being offered an investment stake in the shared ownership project or even full ownership;
- Joint venture both the community and the commercial developer work together to the develop and construct the project, with both parties investing in the project;
- Community developer project development is led by the community and a developer is approached to construct and invest in the shared ownership project.





Case study – Abergwaun Community

Turbine

- 225kW turbine, 45m tip height
- Aims to generate renewable energy and economic resilience in line with the Transition approach.
- Joint ownership venture with a local farmer who is also the freeholder
- The estimated income available for community distribution over twenty years is approximately £660,000
- Overall cost of project £570,000
- Output of 530,000 KWh per year saving 290t CO₂
- The equivalent of powering approximately 130 homes
