#### **ATISN 14992**

Thank you for your request which I received on 12 March 2021. You asked for the following information in relation to Covid restrictions (February 22 – March 12<sup>th</sup> 2021):

- all data that the WG has used as a basis for its decisions re Covid19 (I am particularly interested in why close contact hairdressing services have been allowed to open ahead of other similar (and less risky) services);
- access to the economic data that supports the relaxation of rules regarding supermarkets selling non-essential items as compared to small retailers selling the same (and why it has been decided that they should be given a 3 week sales advantage); and
- data regarding driving tests and why these are not allowed to go ahead despite Wales satisfying the criteria for moving out of tier 4 restrictions as defined by WG itself.

The Welsh Government has set out the decision-making approach in a number of policy documents, which have evolved over time to reflect the changing nature of the pandemic. In date order these are:

### **Driving Tests**

Welsh Government does not hold data relating to driving tests. The Welsh Government announced driving lessons would resume on 12 April and tests on 22 April. This is aligned with the approach set out for England. The link below provides information on the restarting of DVSA services in Wales on the UK Government website which you might find helpful. As set out above, the policy documents explain the criteria for moving out of alert level four. At no point has there been a mechanistic link between specific indicators or thresholds and the lifting of specific restrictions.
