# IMPLEMENTATION REPORT FOR THE EUROPEAN TERRITORIAL COOPERATION GOAL

## IDENTIFICATION OF THE ANNUAL IMPLEMENTATION REPORT

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2. OVERVIEW OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE COOPERATION PROGRAMME (Article 50(2) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013 and Article 14(3)(a) of Regulation (EU) No 1299/2013)

## Key information on the implementation of the cooperation programme for the year concerned, including on financial instruments, with relation to the financial and indicator data.

Note: this report covers the year 2020 where programme performance was significantly affected by the Covid 19 pandemic. Whilst the Programme authorities took pro-active measures to work with and reassure project partners, inevitably implementation delays occurred and progression against indicators was affected. Comments on forecast performance should be considered in the context of the impacts of the ongoing pandemic.

Taking account of the issues surrounding the UK's exit from the EU and the pandemic, the programme has made significant progress. Efforts to mobilise increased engagement in Priority Axes 3 have been rewarded with a good balance of operations having been approved across the operational Priority Axes.

One joint operation and two Phase 2 operations (€4.9m ERDF) were approved during 2020, one project in Priority Axis 1 and two Phase 2 projects in Priority Axis 3.

At the end of December 2020:

- 22 operations have been formally approved (figure includes TA project), resulting in
- €81m ERDF commitment
- 101% of the ERDF allocation for the Programme committed

Ten operations have been approved under PA1 (Cross-Border Innovation), seven approved under PA2 (Climate change), four approved under PA3 (Cultural and Natural Resources and Heritage), and one in PA 4 (Technical Assistance).

A detailed programme situation paper was submitted to the PMC in November 2020. This reported good progress against the range of programme indicators and in particular, the Performance Framework which the PMC noted were well on target to be met and largely exceeded. Twelve of the nineteen operational Priority Axes indicators were expected to meet or exceed targets.

Joint operations approved, as at the end of December 2020, are forecast to support over **700** enterprises by project completion. The achievement at December 2020 of **109** enterprises and research institutions cooperating in research and innovation projects exceeds the target set for the programme.

Operations are forecast to support **78** organisations working in partnership to enhance the marine and coastal environment.

Support for 34 coastal communities to enhance cultural, natural or heritage tourism along the coasts of the cross-border region was forecast by programme end.

Forecast data from approved operations show that more than 100% of the job creation target is forecast to be met by the end of the programming period.

Section 3.2 shows the progress made against the Programme's indicator targets for each Priority Axis.

Whilst the Managing Authority (MA), Joint Secretariat (JS) and delivery partners in Ireland sought to promote and advance the profile of the Programme opportunities were limited due to the Covid 19 pandemic.

## **Programme Meetings**

The PMC met once in 2020:

PMC10 – 18th November 2020 – via Microsoft Teams. The PMC noted good progress with programme delivery, the grant commitment profile and achievement of indicators. The PMC took note of the position on transition measures in light of the deliberations within the UK on Brexit.

#### Communications

Publicity surrounding the Ireland Wales Programme (IWP) remains positive with news stories prominent in both Wales and Ireland with support and positive engagement for projects from politicians, regional and national news outlets and stakeholders on both sides of the cross-border area. This includes the promotion of project launches, such as the Ports, Past and Present project launch by the Minister for International Relations & Welsh Language during Wales Week in Ireland, the online launch of the ECHOES project by the Minister for Environment, Energy and Rural Affairs as well as celebrating project achievements / milestones, such as the recognition for the Ecostructure project in being awarded a EU web Awards, winning "The Better World" category at the EU Web Awards 2020.

## Covid 19

The emergence of Covid 19 and the subsequent national lockdown restrictions put in place at the end of March 2020, significantly affected all pre-planned visits and events, which were postponed or cancelled.

The focus of Welsh Government and the Government of Ireland's communication activity was solely on Covid 19 messages to the public. Likewise, WEFO and Southern Regional Assembly communications activity at this time focussed on re-assuring beneficiaries, project leads and partners about any new processes or arrangements for projects in light of the pandemic.

Whilst the impact of the pandemic has had a significant impact on pre-planned visits and in-person events, projects have adapted well. Communication activity has moved online with all projects delivering a variety of virtual content including launch and closure events, virtual conferences and webinars to promote the IWP and communicate the benefits/ emerging impacts of the programme and project specific activity to stakeholders and the general public.

All standard communication activities such as Ministerial announcements or pro-active social media activity was postponed for a prolonged period of time (12 weeks). This had an impact on the twitter campaigns that would normally have been running for the Ireland-Wales programme on St David's Day, St Patrick's Day and Europe Day.

A new process for funding announcements was established in July with a stronger focus on social media promotion with Ministerial input into lead partner press notices. National lockdown restrictions remained in place in both Ireland and Wales for most of 2020. However, the emergence of online events has increased and has been very well received.

## Website

The website (http://irelandwales.eu/) continues to attract interest; and was visited on 9,629 occasions during 2020 – a rise of 4.5% on the previous calendar year. Each approved project is showcased and promoted with a brief description and a link to their project home website. An interactive map identifies the regions where Ireland Wales projects are delivering activity and also links to information on the wider European Territorial Cooperation or 'Interreg' programmes.

### Social Media

The @IrelandWales Twitter account now has nearly 1,500 followers. During 2020, its content was viewed on around 36,200 occasions and the account was visited over 4,300 times.

The JS continues to liaise closely with approved projects and focus on maintaining a flow of regular bilingual/ trilingual twitter updates and news items for uploading to the Ireland Wales website. Since the beginning of 2020 the JS have implemented a monitoring system to review each projects social media activity on a weekly basis and website content on a monthly basis. This information is used to inform communications recommendation reports, which are produced for each project and updated regularly. The report is shared with the relevant project lead and feeds into ongoing review meetings between the Joint Secretariat and projects to help ensure the Ireland-Wales programme is appropriately promoted and publicity is maximised.

#### 4. SYNTHESIS OF THE EVALUATIONS

As mentioned in the previous AIR the Ireland Wales Territorial Cooperation Programme 2014 to 2020: mid-term evaluation has now been published in May 2020. Below are the recommendations that came out of the evaluation.

#### Recommendations made:

- The Managing Authority should continue with the open/rolling call process for project applications but seek to increase communication with applicants around the expected time taken for delays in applications and provide deadlines by which time applicants can expect feedback.
- In recognition of the importance of having high levels of attendance at Programme Monitoring Committee meetings, the Managing Authority should explore the possibility of drawing up Memoranda of Understanding or using other mechanisms to ensure that stakeholders' resource commitment is recognised by the organisation they are representing.
- The Programme's Joint Secretariat should further explore ways to improve attendance at Programme Monitoring Committee meetings, including the use of robust videoconferencing solutions, if required.
- The Managing Authority should work with projects to draw up a charter that clearly sets out what a project can expect when engaging with the Programme's management, particularly in terms of response times to queries and timescales for decision-making.
- The Programme should develop a plan for the communication of the benefits/emerging impacts of the Programme and its projects to the general public. One mechanism for doing this would be to reorganise the Programme website so that if focuses on the benefits of the Programme's projects.
- In light of the problematic nature of the Programme's result indicators, the Managing Authority should specify that the Final Evaluation should adopt a Contribution Analysis approach to assessing the impact of the Programme, in addition to the required quantitative approach.
- The Managing Authority should provide guidance to projects to ensure that they and/or their project-level evaluations collect qualitative and quantitative data on their effects that can be used by the Programme's final evaluation to to explore the impact as a whole.
- The Managing Authority should also provide guidance to projects to ensure that they and/or their project-level evaluations collect evidence of the project's contribution towards the Cross-Cutting Themes.
- The final evaluation of the Programme should explore the rationale for the Programme's approach to Cross-Cutting Themes and analyse the extent to which it has been successful.

## (a) Issues which affect the performance of the programme and the measures taken

The UK withdrawal from the EU (Brexit) occurred in January 2020, with a transition period in place until January 2021.

With the onset of the Covid 19 pandemic and programme commitment levels and the portfolio of projects strong, during 2020, there were minimal enquiries from potential partners in both Ireland and Wales. The JS registered three proposals at the pre-planning stage:

- One in Priority Axis 2 (ACRA), subsequently withdrawn, and
- Two in Priority Axis 3 (CupHat and Portalis).

Whilst the JS continued to maximise commitment levels and monitor post approval activity during 2020 the key focus was to provide support to approved operations during the pandemic.

### Covid19

The Programme adopted a flexible approach in considering readjustments to projects. The JS initiated regular catch up meetings with all approved operations and asked that each develop a Covid 19 Risk Register. The risk registers are regularly reviewed and updated. The JS instigated several measures including renegotiation of planned expenditure forecasts, the deferral of verification of claims and processing no cost extensions to project timelines. Work packages aimed at tackling some of the impacts of Covid 19 were encouraged; the Acclimatize project updated the PMC on such an initiative in November 2020.

WEFO (MA) introduced a Covid 19 Frequently Asked Questions document, which was circulated to the Lead Partners of all approved projects and uploaded to the Ireland Wales website.
