RUMNEY

- 0-1 Nos 1-2 Hilltop Cottages. Listed but all front windows altered and patio window inserted to garden. Was never special. Propose delisting
- Beili-bach Cottages. Small row of cottages adjacent to church. Probably early C19 but no unaltered window or door survives.
- Whitehall 57 Church Road. House of one of the old Rumney farms.
- 7-12 Church of St Augustine Church Road. Listed suggest grade I or II*.
- 13 15 Church Road The Old Vicarage. Should be assessed with 6 above and 37 below.
- 14-16 Rumney Pottery Newport Road. Listed and should remain so for special historic interest
- 17-18 Rumney Sea Wall. Article in Bulletin of Board of Celtic Studies (vol 27) refers to medieval and later sea wall protecting Rumney and stone sluices called gowts but no sign of these surviving though they may do under later reinforcements; all visible sluices are very new and of wood.
- 20 Quarry Hill off Newport Road copy of old photo
- 21-3 "Listed and should remain so although interior reported as gutted.
- 24 Lodge at Quarry Hill. Not worth adding for group value.
- 25 The Mount Newport Road. Not special.
- 26 Milestone Newport Road. Defaced, only lettering visible 'St Mellons'
- White Lodge Newport Road. Arts and Crafts style building. Likely to have been altered internally as now a nursing home. No known special historic interest.
- 28 Alfred Tilly Memorial Baptist Church Tyr y Sarn Road. Not special.
- 29-30 Rompney Castle PH Wentloog Road. Traditionally said to be built on site of original castle but this cannot be so as Cae Castell, medieval motte, and Castle Rise are well to N. Actually on site of an earlier inn the Pear Tree which was reportedly purchased late C19 by 'American Consul to Cardiff' and completely rebuilt in mock baronial style and re-named accordingly.
- Rumney War Memorial and Memorial Hall Wentloog Road. 'Built to commemorate the men of this parish who fought in the Great War and those who made the supreme sacrifice'. Foundation stones laid 1923 including by Mrs Griffin of Rumney Court and Llewellyn Williams of Llanrumney Hall. Architect W T Gough. Miniature but serious frontage; all side windows replaced with UPVC. Integral War Memorial in forecourt
