'What correspondence has the Cabinet Secretary for Rural Affairs, Huw Irranca Davies, had with members of the UK Government about changes to APR and BPR, and the effect that they will have on Welsh farms?'

Huw Irranca-Davies MS, Deputy First Minister and Cabinet Secretary for Climate Change and Rural Affairs, wrote to the UK Government on 28 January raising concerns about changes to Inheritance Tax and the potential impacts on Welsh farmers.

The letter requests confirmation that the UK Government and HM Treasury (HMT), have engaged directly with Welsh farming unions. If not, it seeks support from the Minister of State for Food Security and Rural Affairs to ensure this engagement happens and HMT responds to the unions' information and analysis.

Additionally, the Deputy First Minister asks for assurances that the Minister has met personally with Welsh farming unions to understand their analysis and convey to HMT for a full response. The letter also emphasises the unique nature of Welsh farming and the need for direct engagement to better understand how the livelihoods of Welsh farming communities can be protected.
