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2001 CENSUS OF POPULATION: FIRST RESULTS ON ETHNIC GROUPS AND IDENTITY

Background


The census question asked: *What is your ethnic group*? - answered by ticking one of 16 boxes arranged in five sections, corresponding to the categories listed in table 1 attached. Accordingly, the Census results show the proportions of the resident population by five broad groups (White, Mixed, Asian, Black and Chinese or other), sub-divided into 11 more specific and 5 'other' ethnic groupings (see table 1 – Note that in the 1991 Census there was no 'Mixed' category identified so comparisons of individual categories between the two censuses will be affected).

The 2001 census form also allowed people to write-in 'Welsh' in order to identify themselves as such. From Spring 2001, the Labour Force Survey introduced a specific identity question – separate from an ethnicity question. Results of the Welsh Local Labour Force Survey 2001 (see below) provide a more reliable indication of the proportion – irrespective of their ethnic background - who regard themselves as Welsh.

Main results

- 2.1 per cent or some 61,600 people have non-White (including Mixed) ethnic (minority) backgrounds (table 1); the proportion in the 1991 census was 1.5 per cent
- the main concentrations of non-white ethnic minorities by local authority area are in the urban areas of south Wales:
 - Cardiff has the highest number and proportion in its population (25,700 and 8.4 per cent) followed by Newport (6,600 and 4.8 per cent)
 - In no other area do those with a non-white ethnic minority background account for more than 2.5 per cent of the population and only in Swansea (4,800 and 2.2 per cent), Rhondda Cynon Taff (2,700 and 1.2 per cent) and The Vale of Glamorgan (2,600 and 2.2 per cent) do they number more than 2,000 (see table 2).

Ethnic minorities as proportion of non-whites



- the non-white ethnic minority population is diverse but the groups that predominate are:
- those of Asian background almost 25,500 people or just over 40 per cent of the total non-white ethnic minority population, a third each being Indian or Pakistani, with an additional 5,000 having a mixed white and Asian background
- those of Caribbean origin, including mixed white and black Caribbean, number some 8,600 people (14 per cent) with a further 6,100 (10 per cent) being of an African (including mixed white and black African) background
- those who identified themselves as Chinese numbered 6,300 (just over 10 per cent). A further 10,100 people indicated other mixed or non-specific origin (in terms of the census categories), another 17,700 indicated Irish and 37,200 other white.

Data that will become available from the census later in the year should allow a more precise attribution of the 'Other' categories to their most closely associated ethnic groups

Whilst 14 per cent of people in Wales identified themselves as Welsh on census forms (by writing-in 'Welsh' in reply to the ethnicity question – instead of or as well as ticking one of the ethnic categories), in the 2001 Welsh Local Labour Force Survey 69 per cent gave their national identity as Welsh when asked to specify between (in the following order): Welsh, English, Scottish, Irish, British or Other (or a combination of these) – see:
